### First responders take the field for Nikiski charity softball game

There were paramedics and state troopers all over Oilers Field Aug. 17, but it was no emergen-

cy. Public safety personnel from around the Kenai Peninsula came together to play a charity softball game to raise money for the Nikiski Children's Fund, the idea of Nikiski High School junior

Carlee Rizzo.

"The Nikiski Children's Fund is something I started last year as a sophomore to supply needs for local children with funds I raised promoting local concerts, bake sales, raffles and now a first responders softball game," said Rizzo.

"I was really grateful it stopped raining. The sun even came out and I think

everyone had a good time." According to Carlee, the fund is designed to get things that kids in Nikiski need as soon as they need it. It has a small board of directors made up of teachers at both Nikiski Middle High and North Star Elementary. Rizzo is the fundraising engine that keeps the charity running.

If a community member or another teacher notices a child needs a helping hand, the funds make it possible for a board member to get them what they need. The Nikiski Children's Fund has

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supplied shoes and coats, paid electric bills and even paid for a student's driving instruction so they could get their license before they graduated from high school.

"It's very immediate," says Rizzo, "The board all has debit cards to the account and can buy what is needed right away."

Rizzo said when a fire broke out at 2:00 a.m. in a Nikiski home last year, a student lost all their possessions. By eight that morning, the Nikiski Chil-

dren's Fund had already purchased clothes for the student so they could attend school that day. Last year, Rizzo says she raised over \$3,500.

The spirit of the fund abounded as fans cheered on their players, knowing that these are the guys who are there for them 24/7 when needed. The six-inning competition ended with the police departments winning in a lopsided contest with a final score of 17-7.

Although there was a little good-natured rivalry on the field, the players all had a great time.

"Public safety members, we don't get together enough un-

less we're in an emergency so this gives us a chance to have fun together," said James Baisden, the fire chief in Nikiski. "We'll get 'em next year!"

All and all, 25 players took the field and raised over \$600 for the Nikiski Children's Fund.

Being played at the Oilers Field, the contest had all the trappings of a real ball game. Matt Wilson and Coach Dan Gensel from KSRM radio group announced the game and Bob Bird, no stranger to the Oiler Field, officiated. There was even the smell of hot dogs in the air grilled up by Senator Peter Micciche. All those details made it a real treat for all

the players, almost like being professional ball players for an evening.

"It made it feel like a real game. You can tell there was a competitive game being played here," said Baisden.

For those who missed the big game?

"If everyone wants to come out again and the Oilers will loan us their field again, you bet!" said Rizzo as she gathered up the bats and balls.

"It was so fun to watch and I feel the best thing I can do while I'm in high school is learning skills that I can do with the Nikiski Children's Fund. I'm learning how to recognize

and supply needs for others, learn how to raise money," said Rizzo.

Carlee's next event to raise funds will be Sept. 2 at 7:00 p.m. at the Triumvirate Theatre, when the nationally famous women's rock group called "No Small Children" comes to Nikiski for a one night stand. These ladies are elementary school teachers by day and rockin' women by night. "No Small Children" recently recorded the soundtrack for the new Ghostbusters movie.
